


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About us as a school

`Teach babies to read?'

One of the most influential pedagogues of school renovation is Maria Montessori, the first woman who graduated from the Faculty of Medicine in Italy. She was interested in children with learning difficulties, those who were then called 'retarded'. When working with them she realized that there were so many things that could be done to improve their learning. From an early age she taught them through the senses, sight, touch, hearing. Her results were impressive to such an extent that some of the 'retarded' children began to perform like normal children. As a result, Dr. Montessori came to the conclusion that healthy children were not even given a small percentage of what their potential could develop. Montessori's schools were implemented throughout Europe quickly. With her methodology, children normally learn to read words at four years of age.

Sixty years later, another doctor, Glenn Doman, treated children with brain injuries. In the 60s he founded an institute for the Achievement of Human Potential which produced magnificent results of improvement and recovery through a treatment program. For Glenn Doman children had an extraordinary curiosity and ability to learn. The soon as they begin walking they touch everything they have around them, they put everything in their mouths, they break or they push objects, they fall over, put their fingers in the socket ... Their curiosity is hard because we have to watch them all the time to prevent them from getting hurt... However if we value this great curiosity and naturally encourage it at the right times, they will benefit from it. So, what is the Doman method? It is a method of learning to read designed to be used by parents who apply it naturally, fun, as a game. The methodology involves the use of cards that are shown to the child several times a day, in short periods of time and in series of 10 stimuli. This is how to boost learning by stimulating and optimising the curiosity and desire to learn from babies. It is based on the idea of intelligence bits, which are units of information that the child can understand and assimilate. Based on this idea, the baby can learn to relate the letters without needing to know the alphabet, because he understands the concept itself and associates it with the word. It is essential that the activity be lived as a fun and communicative game. In his book, How to teach your baby to read, Glenn Doman explains all the steps and how the parents themselves can develop and create the material. We can agree more or less with Glenn Doman, but it is definitely a book we must read.

But not all Vikings were pirates and raiders, many flied to other countries to settle and farm, while others travelled to seas to find goods to take back home to Scandinavia.


What did Vikings eat? Vikings farmed crops, grew gardens and raised animals.

Sweatshops are a workplace in which workers are employed at low wages and under unhealthy or oppressive conditions.


<u>Where do we find sweatshops? What are the sweatshops workers</u> paid? Who works in sweatshops?

Workers in Bangladesh are paid 0,13 cents per hour. However, the workers are not always paid and if they are, they are usually paid less than they should earn. This workers suffer from violence, slavery and abuse.

Giraffes danger of extinction

Giraffe is a mammalian animal, it is native to Africa, and it is characterized by its long neck. The name "giraffes" derives from the mixture of three languages: Latin, Greek and Arabic.

It is the tallest animal in the world with an average height between 14 and 17 metres.

The females have hair on the top, but the males do not. In the neck they have 7 vertebrae, this gives them flexibility and a wide range of movements. They are extremely fast.

The males can reach the height of 5-6 metres from their legs to the horns. Females are approximately one metre shorter.

Giraffes feed mainly on acacia and commiphora (myrrh) trees. Because of their height, they can easily pluck the leaves from the tops of these tall trees. A giraffe can eat up to 63 kgs of leaves and branches every day.

Two subspecies of giraffes were recently added to the list of "critically endangered" species for the first time ever ,as per the latest report by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN),which administers the world's official endangered species list.

The Kordofan giraffe and the Nubian

As with the endangerment or extinction of any animal or plant species now, humans are at the root of it. Increased urbanisation, poaching and illegal hunting practices as well as civil unrest in parts of Africa prove to be an increasing danger for giraffes.

How many of you can say that the cotton in your clothes hasn't been picked by children who were trafficked to work on a farm? It's a hard question, the clothing supply chain is a complex system. The truth is hidden from us by the actors in the fashion industry. Even some clothes factories themselves are oblivious to the truth by their material suppliers. Currently, only 5% of the companies know where their inputs come from. The fashion industry and fashion itself is a complicated topic. I'm going to write about fashion, focusing mainly on the fashion industry.

Fast fashion

What Is Fast Fashion?

Fast fashion is cheap, trendy clothing that joins and represents ideas from catwalk models, celebrities and culture. The name tells us that the process in which these garments are made is quick.

When Did Fast Fashion Start?

Fast fashion all started when we had the **industrial revolution**. The Industrial Revolution was the introduction to new manufacturing processes and technology in Europe and the US, in the period from about 1760 to sometime between 1820 and 1840.

What impact does fast fashion and fashion itself have?

Fast fashion and fashion itself impact our world in many different ways; socially, environmentally, and even economically. However, I'm going to be writing about the social and environmental impact, as they are the most known, severe and common impacts. **Socially:**

The main effect fast fashion has on society is how people follow fashion slavishly; **Fashion victims**. Why do we follow fashion? The answer is once again complicated and complex, the international fashion industry plays and takes advantages with our negative feelings, they make people feel they must keep up with new trends and keep shopping. They take advantage of our desire and anxiety about not fitting in, not being up-to-date, and being an outsider. I think that the fashion industry dictates to society what to wear. Fashion doesn't promote self expression, personal character expression or originality. In my opinion, style is far more important. Fashion is universal, style is personal. Fashion is normal, style is unique. Fashion is copied, style is awed.

Environmentally :

The fashion industry is the second largest polluter in the world.

- Water Pollution and use: 200,000 tons of dyes are thrown in the ocean every year. It takes 2,700 litres of water to make one cotton shirt, enough to meet the average person's drinking needs for two-and-a-half years.
- **Ocean pollution:** Every time we wash a synthetic garment, about 1,900 individual microfibers are released into the water, making their way into our oceans. These are then eaten by fish, introducing plastic in our food chain.
- Fashion waste and accumulation: Only 15% of the clothing in this world is recycled or donated, the rest goes directly to the landfill or is incinerated. Synthetic fibres, such as polyester, are plastic fibres, can take up to 200 years to decompose. Making a pair of jeans produces as much greenhouse gas as driving a car more than 80 miles. ... She left junior school to be a nurse in Toronto, then she completed high school in Chicago. In 1920 she got her licence to be a pilot, then in 1921 she bought her first airplane "Kinner Airster."

On May 20–21, 1932 she flew from <u>Harbour Grace</u>, <u>Newfoundland</u>, to <u>Londonderry</u>, <u>Northern Ireland</u>, and did it in a record time of 14 hours and 56 minutes.

Death theory





An animal is a living being too, like us, are we better than the animals?


Vegan people are vegan because they think that this isn't ethical.

When was smoking invented and for what was invented?


It was invented in the year 1885 and it was used or the same thing as now the same.




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
